Although my parents are against a lot of what I do, they don't prevent me from going to my *duroos* with my well known *Salafi* teacher, in my area, which they consider them to be *munafiqun*, in the eyes of the people where I live. My brother is in great disagreement with the *Salafi* here, he makes my parents believe that we're extreme and lost. He even claims that I follow other people as a source of guidance or a form of *shirk*. He says I'm extreme because I stay away from gatherings where the speakers are unknown and where they play *nasheeds* and where comedy is performed. He says it's against Shaykh **Rabia** because the Shaykh closed the doors of *Jihad Wa Allāhu musthan*. I have tried to explain to him with good manners, what a *Salafiyyah* really is. And he says, he knows what it is because he considers himself a *Salafi*. I have on several occasions cut ties with him, but I always end up going back to him and ask him for forgiveness out of fear that my good deeds will not be accepted. He puts doubts in my head. Is there any sin upon me if I do not talk to him anymore, as this has become a big problem to my *deen*? And how can I convey the message of *Salafi* to my parents?
